New hospital project remains on schedule: To open early 2013 ...

Nearly 11 months after breaking ground, the new King's Daughters' Hospital remains on schedule to open in early 2013. Construction should be finished in late 2012.

The new hospital will feature private patient rooms, a larger emergency department, inpatient and outpatient surgery, updated OB labor and delivery suites, an integrated Intensive Care Unit, and the latest imaging and diagnostic tools. Guests and visitors will enjoy a first-floor dining room and courtyard, improved signage, and comfortable guest seating areas.

The attached Community Medical Arts Building (CMAC) will house a variety of physician offices and support services, along with a Patient Access Center. We want to make your visit as convenient and comfortable

as possible. Physician specialties moving to the hilltop location include: OB/GYN, Pediatrics, Internal Medicine, General Surgery, Urology, Ear-Nose-Throat, Orthopedics, Pulmonology, Neurology, and Family Practice.

For 112 years, the King's Daughters' Hospital has served local families. Our commitment to providing exceptional medical care hasn't changed. The new hospital will enable us to continue our mission.

Although not always easy, change is something we face throughout our lives. Our current facility is no longer capable of serving the growing health needs of the people we serve. Why private rooms make a big difference ...

When you or someone you know is in the hospital, privacy is an important issue. Having a private room is more comfortable and reduces exposure to guests and visitors. All rooms at the new KDH will be private.

The private rooms will offer more than twice the space of shared rooms. Every patient will have his/her own windows. Family members will have a place to sit, and every room will have its own bathroom.

Private rooms are quieter. Each patient will have the option to watch TV, read, or rest without disturbing anyone else. Each patient will also be able to control lighting and room temperature. With HVAC technology, every room will have its own temperature control.

Thanks to our new design, patients will also be transported in private hallways, away from public hallways and elevators.



The image above provides a first-hand look at what a private room will look like at the new KDH. Windows provide natural lighting. Room design makes it efficient for nurses to provide care and for families to visit. With all patient rooms having the same layout, care providers will know exactly where everything is.

The new KDH will have 86 private beds, the same number of total beds the hospital has today. There will be 72 general rooms and 14 OB rooms.

Smiles make our day ...

Helping kids with autism reach their full potential

These days, when Nick Voris arrives for his "play" sessions at the KDH Rehab Center, he's all boy. He's active, shows affection, and talks openly. That wasn't the case when he first arrived four years ago.

Nick has autism, a neural developmental disorder often characterized by impaired social interaction and communication, and restricted or repetitive behavior. Symptoms of autism can be mild to severe. Early recognition, intense therapy, and school intervention are the best treatment options. Which is why the KDH Rehab Center works with local physicians and schools to help kids reach their full potential.

"When we first came here, Nick made few if any noises and didn't want to have any physical contact with people," his mom, Connie, said. "Now, he wants to jump on your lap and wants to give hugs and kisses. And he wants to talk to you. He's very busy."

Connie said Nick, age 7, loves to swim, swing, and sing. His favorite tunes are "I am the champion" and the theme from the movie, "Chicken Little."

Most weeks, Nick receives both Occupational and Speech Therapy. Team members use games and activities to aid learning. These help with sensory and sound development.

"He's made such huge progress," Connie said. "He recognizes letters and words. He's starting to be able to tell us what he wants."

Jacob Leach, 13, has been coming to the Rehab Center for 10 years. He's developed a love for magazines, tractors and trucks, and music. Jacob's mom, April, said the team works closely with teachers at the junior high school so that everyone is on the same page. Jacob focuses a lot on fine motor skills, visual perception, and eye-hand coordination.

"His comprehension has really improved," April said. "He can say and use a lot of words. He can indicate to us what he wants."

Therapists use pictures and activities that kids like to help them focus and improve. For example, Nancy Deuser, from Speech Therapy, uses a computer and videos as two of several options to help students learn. She wants sessions to be fun and effective.

Team members also use the Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS) which uses picture symbols to help students communicate effectively. Because every child is unique, therapists work hard to see what motivates each child to learn.

A co-worker wrote: *Dave has served for a number of years as the athletic trainer for the high schools. In particular, he has pioneered efforts to bring concussion awareness to our community - especially in Madison. Since about 2002, we have had the concussive testing computer program that monitors an athlete's concussive injury effects. Dave brought this to the attention of the Madison School Board and championed Madison into using the program. This was several years ago when there was much less publicity about concussions and concussion testing. Our school was one of the first high schools in Indiana and probably the country to have its own system. We owe that to Dave Pappenheim. As more and more publicity about concussions reaches the forefront, I see multiple stories about how schools are using this. This has been commonplace in Madison now for approaching a decade.*

- Avoiding eye contact and wanting to be alone.

How to Dispose of Unused Medications ...

How should you dispose of expired medications or medications that you no longer use?

If disposal instructions are included with the medication, follow the directions given. If disposal instructions were not provided or you no longer have the instructions, here are some tips ...

- Take the medications out of their original container and mix them with old coffee grounds or kitty litter. This makes the pills less likely to be picked up out of the trash. Peel off or destroy the label on the medication bottle to protect your privacy. Put the medications in a sealable bag to keep them from leaking out of a larger trash bag.

- Do not flush medications down the toilet.
